Research Leadership

I was the co-principal investigator on two large projects on the role of procedural and distributive justice in a variety of types of negotiations, including peace negotiations, trade, arms control, and climate change negotiations. These projects were supported by grants from the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs (2009-2010: OZA 1072135) and the Riksbakens Jubileumsfond, Sweden (2010-2014: P09-0448: 1-E). It resulted in numerous articles and chapters. Another, developed a 50-case data set of civil war termination negotiations. It was

supported by the Swedish Research Council (2015-2017: CO114201). It also resulted in numerous articles and chapters.

I served as president of the major research society in my field in 2011-2012 (the International Association for Conflict Management). I was the director of the doctoral program at the Institute for Conflict Analysis and Resolution from 1997-2002. A considerable amount of my professional work consists of the integration of research and practice. I conducted research-based training in four continents from 1995-2010. Much of this work appears in a number of publications listed in the full CV. I wrote the first research methods textbook in the field (Doing Research: Methods of Inquiry for Conflict Analysis, [2005], Thousand Oaks CA: Sage). I am currently organizing a biennial conference on negotiation and mediation to be held on November 19, 2021. I have collaborated with colleagues and students from all over the world.
